# RATIONALE AND PURPOSE OF THE QUALIFICATION

### **RATIONALE:**

In pursuit of a high-quality degree, the Faculty of Humanities qualification is motivated by the aims of the National Cultural Policy (2001), which states that cultural identity is one of the critical ingredients for nation building and attainment of national sovereignty. The curriculum of the education system is based on the Botswana culture and provide qualifications and facilities aimed at teaching skills of culture centered disciplines. Botswana Vision 2036 emphasizes that the nation is multilingual and multicultural and should use this diversity as a key to its unity and development. The qualification is also informed by the Revised National Policy on Education (1994), the National Human Resources Development Strategy (2009-2-22) and the Botswana Education and Training Sector Strategy Plan (2015-2020) documents, which point that people, as key centre of development, should be well-rounded by knowing their past, be proud of their identity, have self-esteem and ethical standing; be competent and skilful communicators. Such qualities are necessary for work and citizenship attribute, intercultural understanding, critical thinking, problem solving, research skills and life-long learning.

As a member of the United Nations, Botswana is also guided by 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, as such Botswana is committed to providing quality education to all its citizens. SDG 4 pertaining to Quality Education articulates the need to "ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all." The qualification ensures equal access and participation

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for all women and men to affordable and quality education with relevant skills for employment; decent jobs, and entrepreneurship skills. The Humanities qualification is aptly aligned to this global goal by providing quality liberal arts education for all.

Tertiary institutions also have road maps used to align themselves with the Botswana government aspirations. For example, University of Botswana's strategy, "Creating a Future for the Knowledge Generation 2020-2029 (CFKG). The CFKG's strategic goal 1 is to "Produce quality well-rounded employable graduates". The proposed BA Humanities Degree is structured in such a way that it promotes maximum flexibility in selecting and streaming of courses to allow students to learn what is relevant and useful to their individual career paths as desired through the CFKG. The degree combines different aspects of the humanities courses like languages, theology and religious studies, archaeology, media studies plus history. This means that the degree will also support the goals of the National Cultural Policy of promoting Botswana as a multilingual country. This qualification produces graduates with different religions and cultures and thereby feeding the Botswana Vision 2036 aim of being a tolerant nation.

Applied research and innovation (Strategic Goal 2 of the CFKG) is another important goal desired by the government at large in order to lay the foundation for a knowledge-based economy. Students in the humanities will be equipped with skills for research in various areas such as indigenous knowledge, ethnography, culture, history and others to assist government in policy and decision making. The document inculcates the spirit of flexibility and responsiveness in which new ideas are nurtured and supported. Research harmonizes the existing national attributes (socio-cultural, critical thinker, social-cultural) with newly formulated ones to create new opportunities. Furthermore, it produces high quality people embracing diversity and strives to lead to success, thus realizing the National Human Resources Development Strategy 2009-2022.

## **PURPOSE:**

The purpose of the qualification is to equip candidates with knowledge, skills and competence to:

- understand and deal with cultural identity and heritage, ethical awareness and responsibility, communication strategies, information dissemination and technology networking.
- understand and be sensitive to human ideas, behavior, languages, culture and its mediation, with a particular emphasis on humanity in Africa and the rest of the world.

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• discover and appreciate the heritage and liberal arts of the societies of Africa in general and of southern Africa and Botswana in particular.

• preserve and promote cultural heritage of Botswana through research and learning in the various academic subjects.

# **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS (including access and inclusion)**

The minimum entry requirement for this qualification will be as follows:

- Learners enrolling in the qualification will hold NCQF Level IV, Certificate 4 (Botswana General Certificate of Secondary Education) qualification or an equivalent qualification.
- Considerations for admission through Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL), Credit Accumulation and Transfer System (CATS) will be done in accordance with the National Recognition of Prior Learning and Credit Accumulation and Transfer policies.

#### QUALIFICATION AWARD AND CERTIFICATION

#### **Qualification Award**

To be awarded a BA in Humanities Degree, a candidate is required to achieve a minimum of 484 credits.

#### Certification

- Candidates meeting requirements will be awarded a BA in Humanities Degree in accordance with standards for the award of the qualification and applicable policies.
- On completion of the qualification, a certificate will be issued, indicating the chosen specialization.

#### REGIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL COMPARABILITY

The structure of the degree is domesticated and Afrocentric, but it compares well with regional and international universities. This makes it feasible for graduates to enrol for graduate studies outside the country as well as transferring of credits from one university to the other.

It is observed that the BA in Humanities as a 4-year long degree produces graduates who are equipped with skills necessary for them to proceed to graduate studies particularly in the areas of research and report writing. Other universities offer a 3-year degree which does not allow time for research. In those universities, graduates are compelled to enroll for an honors Degree in order to produce students with skills of the same level as BA in Humanities. The BA in Humanities offers main modules from the Humanities disciplines (although students are allowed to combine with disciplines from other faculties). Other comparative universities offer degrees titled "Bachelor of Arts" and tend to conglomerate modules from different disciplines like humanities, social sciences, and business.

The variety of modules and variety of combination options, makes this BA in Humanities fit in with international university standards and therefore produces graduates at par with those from outside the country. Moreover, the variety of modules provided enables international exchange students to find modules that match with those in their own universities and makes it easy for transfer of

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their parent universities and local universities offering the BA in Humanities qualification. Moreover, students wishing to do permanent transfer from local universities are given an advantage of having done some modules that fit in with international universities. Below is a list of other similarities and differences observed:

#### Similarities:

- They all stress comprehensive mastery of a body of knowledge and its relation to the interdisciplinary study of information science and technology, expertise in research design, data collection and analysis.
- They prepare graduates for professional practice and allow diverse career paths
- They all produce graduates who are competitive in the marketplace

#### Differences:

- This BA qualification allows for a more diverse and more flexible combination of courses
- This BA qualification courses are not limited in geographical and spatial spread. For example, other universities focus more on ancient and classical studies while this BA is open to all time periods.
